Annual ACC Walkthrough

"The architectural committee would like to announce the Annual ACC Walkthrough date as June 3rd, 2023. The most common issue that came up at last year's walkthrough was bushes, plants, trees, and landscaping beds encroaching upon the sidewalk. Please make sure to clear away those things before the walk through! Here is the policy for reference:

Landscaping Maintenance - ACC Standards - 08/16/2008

- 1. Trees and shrubs shall be trimmed to avoid encroachment on neighbors' property or on sidewalks or streets.
- 2. A minimum of an 8-foot clearance is required above sidewalks and a maximum of two-inch encroachment of plants over sidewalks.
- 3. Dead trees or limbs, weeds, dead plants, and fallen leaves must be removed in a timely manner.
- 4. Visible lawns and gardens shall be maintained free of weeds and dead plants.
- 5. Shrubs and lawns shall be trimmed to avoid overgrowth or an unkempt appearance.
- Rock or mulches shall be contained and prevented from spilling over on sidewalks, driveways, or flowerbeds."

CenCon 2/27/2023 Meeting Notes

Centennial Council of Neighborhoods. Tiffany is a member.

The Community Associations Institute – Rocky Mountain Chapter (CAI-RMC) is introducing a bill to the state legislature that prohibits the restrictions on dog breeds in HOAs. Sheriff captain McKlim again reiterated that auto theft/break-ins are the major crime in Centennial.

Always keep your car/truck locked. The Arapahoe Sheriff's department plans an open house in June at the E. Broncos Parkway location. All are invited and snacks will be provided. For more details (when they become available), check https:// www.arapahoegov.com/1721/Sheriffs-Office.

The Arapahoe Library District reported that there is an opening on the Board of Trustees if anyone is interested. Also, a virtual presentation of the history of Simon and Garfunkel will be on April 6th. Check their website for more details.

Robin Carnes of the Centennial City Council described the partnership with the YMCA which is opening a site near the old Sears building in the Streets at SouthGlenn which will mainly target virtual programs. Affordable housing issues were discussed. Also note was made to the short you-tube video "City of Centennial, Colorado | 2018".

The last portion of the meeting was a presentation by the Arapahoe DA office on "Homeowner Contractor Fraud". The presentation explained the crossover from civil to criminal situations. This is a gray area which requires a lot from the homeowner to perform due diligence, obtaining detailed bids and thoughtful planning.

CARDBOARD CLASSIC: Saturday, April 8, 2023


Gondola Square, Steamboat Springs

April Gardening Calendar

April is a busy gardening month and the beginning of the planting season. When soil has thawed – Divide and transplant summer and fall blooming perennials. Label your plants as you plant and subdivide. Plant trees, shrubs and vines. If you purchase bare root plants, soak them in water for several hours before planting.



Lawns: To grow a beautiful lawn, begin with aeration. If weather is warm and dry water one inch a week. This is prime time to examine your irrigation system. Check for leaks or problems with sprinkler heads. Examine the lines and emitters to be sure everything is working in drip irrigation.

If you're planning to try soaker hoses in your garden choose a sunny day to lay out the curled-up hose. It's much easier to set in place once the hose has relaxed. Also, put some sort of markers along the soaker hose so you won't slice into it when planting. I use colorful golf tees.

Weeds: These persistent survivors seemed to come up earlier than usual this year. Hand pull the young ones before they get too big... or too many.

Late freeze damage to trees and shrubs: If we get a sudden freeze and new, emerging leaves wilt and look brown wait at least a week to see if new growth emerges. Frozen plant tissue is soft and wet and vulnerable to infection if it's 'open.' If a branch fails to revive it may be necessary to prune again.

Container Gardens

It has been a long winter in Colorado this year, but its time to start thinking about how you would like your yard to look this summer!

Container gardens are one of the fastest growing segments of gardening. Containers can be grown where traditional gardens are not possible including apartment balconies,



small courtyards, decks, patios, and areas with poor soil. They are an ideal solution for people in rental situations, with limited mobility, or with limited time to care for a large landscape.

Since containers are portable, they can be placed around outdoor living spaces during their prime and then removed or replaced after they've become spent. Container gardens add instant color to the landscape and interest to outdoor living spaces. Containers are generally comprised of annual blooming plants, and the look is easily changed from year to year as compared to traditional landscapes. There are a variety of plants available for containers including: annuals, perennials, small shrubs, and even vegetable and herbs.



Free Outdoor Fun

RED ROCKS PARK & AMPHITHEATRE

Carved from towering red rock monuments, Red Rocks Park & Amphitheatre is one of the world's most renowned concert venues. When there's no concert, the free Visitor Center has a museum and Performers' Hall of Fame, while the surrounding park offers hiking trails that weave in, around and over the colorful red rocks.

LARIAT LOOP BYWAY

Retrace the motoring adventures of the early 1920s and experience the thrill of foothills exploration at the dawn of the Age of Motorcars on the Lariat Loop, a 40-mile scenic circle in the foothills west of Denver. The Lariat Loop takes motorists to several popular attractions, including the Buffalo Bill Museum & Grave, the Colorado Railroad Museum and the Mother Cabrini Shrine.

DINOSAUR RIDGE

See some dinos — or what's left of them, anyway. Dinosaur Ridge in Morrison features famous Jurassic dinosaur bones, such as Stegosaurus and Apatosaurus, discovered in 1877, and Cretaceous dinosaur footprints. A guidebook is available for use on self-guided tours.

LITTLETON MUSEUM

Travel back in time at the Littleton Museum and get a glimpse into Colorado's pioneer past. Located on 39 acres in Littleton, the museum consists of two living history farms (one from the 1860s and one from the 1890s), with a working farm, a blacksmith shop and more than 40,000 historic Colorado artifacts.

PLAINS CONSERVATION CENTER

The Plains Conservation Center in Aurora helps students and adults grow their knowledge and appreciation of the prairie ecosystem and the cultural history of Colorado through a variety of educational programs managed by Denver Botanic Gardens in cooperation with the City of Aurora. It's always free to visit and hike the trails, explore the visitor center and check out the tipis and homestead village. There is a fee to attend any guided programs.

GARDEN OF THE GODS

Located just 60 miles from Denver, the awe-inspiring Garden of the Gods in Colorado Springs features gigantic 500-foot-high red sandstone rock monuments at the base of Pikes Peak.

Discover Watchable Wildlife

The area around Walden in northern Colorado is considered the moose-viewing state capital, with some 600 of Bullwinkle's buddies roaming free. Wilderness access is easy at State Forest State Park, which even has a moose-themed visitor center.

The Colorado Birding Trail is actually a network of 54 trails renowned for their magnificent landscapes and unique bird species. Our picks for families are on the eastern plains, where you'll find the exotic-looking Greater Prairie-Chicken in April and May (viewing tours recommended) or the springtime migrating beauties on the Playa Trail.

Want to get a guaranteed great view of bears, wolves, lions and tigers? Head to the Wild Animal Sanctuary in Keenesburg. This extraordinary rescue organization has saved more than 1,000 mistreated animals from across the globe and given them new life on the natural plains of Colorado. An elevated walkway lets you closely observe these majestic creatures without invading their space.
