CenCON 11/27/2023 Meeting Notes

Centennial Council of Neighborhoods. Tiffany is a member.

Tonight's meeting was the last meeting of the year. The Arapahoe sheriff warned us that "Puffing" (warming your car unattended in the winter) is illegal in Centennial and is the main cause of stolen cars. Most thefts in Centennial are having valuables visible in an unlocked car. He also warned against displaying Christmas presents under a tree visible through a picture window. This invites burglars.

The City of Centennial has just approved the 2023/2024 budget. The 2023 adopted budget is \$123.8MM which is 3.2% higher than the 2022 adopted budget. The 2023 budget has a \$1MM increase for the police department to hire more police needed to patrol the streets.

The South Metro Fire and Rescue gave a short talk on the risks of lithium ion batteries. Currently lithium batteries are not a big problem as quality has improved with time, but here are things you should be aware of. Battery fires are an electrical fire and difficult to extinguish. Smothering with specialized blankets is best. Much like smothering a kitchen fire with a wet towel is preferred in order to cut off the oxygen to the fire. Cooking fires are the most common residential fire. The smoke given off from a lithium battery fire is toxic which is another reason to get away from it instead of staying and trying to fight it. One of the main causes in lithium battery fires is from a defective or incompatible charger. Beware of buying cheap replacement chargers on Amazon etc.

Though not practical, charging lithium batteries is preferred and simply leaving batteries in their charging cradle after they are fully charged is discouraged. Newer EV cars pose a new problem for fire fighters in that in a serious crash, the "Jaws of Life" could unwittingly cut through high voltage hidden cables putting everyone in the rescue at risk.
